NEWS OF THE SAD LOSS OF FOLKESTONE PRIEST

St. Peter's Church, Folkestone

St Peter's Church, Folkestone are sorry to announce the death of Father David Adlington from a suspected heart attack in the Vicarage, on 4th January 2018.



Rev. David Adlington (1951-2018) studied at Kings College London and St. Augustine's College, Canterbury. Father David was ordained as Deacon in 1973 and served his curacy at St. Paul's, Clapham (1974-1977) and St. Matthew's. Bethnal Green

(1977-1980). He was ordained Priest in 1975. He served as Priest at St. Peter's, Stepney and was Succentor (responsible for liturgy and music) at Southwark Cathedral (1984-1987) before moving to Wales where he became Succentor at Llandaff Cathedral and then Priest of several Parishes between 1988 and 2000. He was Diocesan Director of Education (1991-2000).

Father David moved to the Canterbury Diocese in 2000, becoming Priest in Charge of St. Mary and St. Eanswythe, Folkestone (2000-2009) and then at St. Mary's, Elham (2009-2013). He returned to Folkestone in 2013 to be the Vicar of St. Mary, St. Eanswythe and St. Saviour, Folkestone and Vicar of St. Peter's, Folkestone, being the first incumbent to hold the two Benefices jointly. Father David was an Honourable Minor Canon at Canterbury Cathedral (since 2001) and had been serving as Area Dean of the Elham Deanery since 2014. Father David was widely recognised across Folkestone from events such as Town Sunday and The Blessing of the Fisheries.

Churchwarden, Dr David Wilson, of St. Peter's Church said:

"He was deeply loved by his parishioners and especially by the children of St. Peter's School, St. Mary's Primary Academy and St. Eanswythe's School. We are all devastated."

A Brief History of Cheriton by Vincent Williams

St Martin's church has stood on the hillside at the top of the Horn Street valley, at the west end of Folkestone for over a thousand years. The date the church was built is not known, however the original building (consisting of the nave and tower) was built prior to 900AD.

Inside of the church one can see the original Saxon doorway into the tower and a Saxon window above. This building is the oldest church in Folkestone and the parish church of Cheriton. But whereas many local history books have documented Folkestone few have given Cheriton more than a passing mention; mostly to acknowledge the fact that the churchyard contains the grave of Samuel Plimsoll, a Liberal M.P. for Derby, who is world renowned for creating the "Plimsoll Line" on ships which has undoubtedly saved the lives of many thousands of seamen, and earned him the nickname "The Sailor's Friend."

There is evidence of a settlement in what we now know as Cheriton as early as 2500BC although little is known about the settlers. The only evidence, so far, comes from the discovery of late-Neolithic pottery in 1972 by workmen laying a water main. The suggestion was that the two vessels found may have been casually discarded domestic rubbish, but they were more likely to be burial vessels as their condition tended to suggest they were buried complete. The two vessels found dated from different periods, the earlier one from the middle of the third millennium BC and a more complete bowl probably from around 2000BC. Other excavations in 1948 had also unearthed pottery believed to be Belgic and Samian ware, from a later period, 1st century AD. At the time

it was suggested, although not conclusively proved, that this find gave credence to a Roman road from Lympne to Dover passing through this area.

The name Cheriton derives from the Old English words "Cirice tūn" meaning Church farmstead and this church, as mentioned above, dates from Saxon times with additions being made in the 13th, 14th, 19th and 21st centuries. However, most people today think of Cheriton not as the rural village that stretches down the Horn Street valley but the built up area straddling the main road into Folkestone.

Land ownership in early times was based on service usually granted perhaps in the first instance by the monarch of the day and then granted similarly by his supporters. According to Hasted's History of Kent in 1790 there were several manors within Cheriton, namely: Cheriton, Enbrook, Bishops Enbrook, Sweet Arden, Caseborne, Swetton and Ackhanger. Records of these date back to the 12th century, but some had long since disappeared by the 18th century and Hasted's time. It is important to note also that the word "manor" does not necessarily mean that a stately home existed; the manor might just as easily have been a farmstead or other building and the surrounding land. In fact until the late 1800s well over 90% of Cheriton was agricultural land. But with the arrival of the railway and





the resulting success of Folkestone as a tourist resort together with the proximity of Shorncliffe Camp, a separate entity called Cheriton Street sprang up to service the needs of both the army camp and Folkestone's hotels. In fact Cheriton's main industry was to become the laundry business and earned it the name of the "Washtub of Folkestone!" Gradually the villages or hamlets of Cheriton, Risborough, Barton and now Cheriton Street have all merged into one – Cheriton as we now know it. Over the years industries have come and gone the brickyards, and Dormobile (who converted Vauxhall cars and Bedford vans). And the invention of the washing machine sounded the death knell for the laundry industry with the last laundry closing down in the 1980s.

The Channel Tunnel has brought some prosperity whilst robbing it of ancient agricultural land, and yet Cheriton has continued to survive and grow in size with recent housing developments on former Shorncliffe Camp land.

So with Cheriton possibly losing some of its own identity from becoming simply an outskirt of Folkestone, local resident and author Vince Williams, has decided to chronicle the history of Cheriton in a series of books which are raising money for a new community centre. Seven 80 page volumes are available from Rocheforts Newsagents and Forget Me Not in Cheriton. The latest, Volume 5 is available at a cost of £10 for paperbacks and £15 for hardbacks. Five volumes chronicle various shops, buildings, business, schools, Shorncliffe Camp, and important events and people. The other two volumes focus on St Martins and All Souls Churches.

'A Good Reputation Endures Forever'

A History of the Chinese Labour Corps in World War I 31st January – 17th March, 2018

The story of the Chinese Labour Corps, or CLC, has until recently been greatly overlooked in the context of WWI history. Folkestone Museum in partnership with Durham University Oriental

Museum and The Meridian Society now present an exhibition revealing the immense contribution these men made to the war effort: building roads and docks; assembling equipment; digging trenches; and clearing mines.

After war broke out in France and Belgium, the Allies found themselves having to replenish their troops with men from munitions factories and strategic ports. To replace them, the British came up with the idea of enlisting labourers from China, known to be resilient, hardworking and in need of money. China was at the point of being carved up between various empires and was determined to gain a place for itself at the diplomatic table and regain control of its territories. 140,000 men were recruited, approximately 96,000 by the British alone. After intense military training in China they made the gruelling journey over sea and land, mainly via Canada and the U.K. Exposed to new diseases, understandably not all of the men survived and six of the CLC now have their final resting places at Shorncliffe Cemetery.

This exhibition will bring together artefacts and documentary photographs from the W.J. Hawkings Collection, courtesy of his grandson John de Lucy, to explore the history of the CLC and reveal more about the men buried at Shorncliffe Cemetery. In addition to the material from Durham University, some of the artefacts for the Folkestone exhibition have been donated by direct descendants of the CLC and their commanding officers and have never been on

show before, including a rare CLC service medal and an original CLC ID booklet from a recruit who died on route through Canada.

A series of adult and family friendly workshops, along with a screening of the film of oral histories produced by the Meridian Society, Forgotten Faces of the First World War, will take place alongside the exhibition. We also hope to offer an exciting insight into the activities the CLC would have indulged in at Chinese New Year on February 17th. Please check our website and social media for updates on associated events.

The exhibition will travel to Plymouth and Liverpool where the other CLC members who died on British soil are buried. Dates of exhibitions are to be confirmed. Please check the relevant institution's website for further details.



Folkestone Town Council Champion Bollard & Bin Renovation across the Town



Folkestone Town Council have funded the painting of bollards and bins in the Towns colours to aesthetically and significantly enhance Folkestone's highways, and by working in partnership with Kent County Council and Shepway District Council, aim to further develop the improvement scheme in repairing, replacing and repainting railings and bus shelters in areas where they are particularly damaged and unsightly.

Rare dinosaur footprint found in Folkestone

The newly opened Folkestone Museum has recently acquired a very important donation.

Steve Friedrich, a well-known local collector and fossil hunter with over 40 years' experience, has discovered a rare dinosaur footprint including a trackway on the beach at Folkestone. It was found on 28 September 2017 in the Lower Greensand, making it around 120 million years old (Cretaceous period). Steve immediately realised the importance of the find and donated it to Folkestone Museum.

The Museum's Collections Officer, Phil Hadland, who helped to retrieve the find, had previously found evidence of dinosaur footprints in Folkestone. It was asserted by some that such footprints could not be found here because the local rocks are supposedly all from marine sediments. However it is now thought possible that the creatures were wandering ancient shorelines during low tides and scavenging. In Utah in the United States, it was recently discovered that some dinosaurs ate shellfish so it is plausible that they were doing the same in Folkestone.

The dinosaur that made this track is thought to have belonged to the theropods - a group of dinosaurs that included Tyrannosaurus Rex. Like most theropod dinosaurs, it walked on two legs and had three toes on each foot touching the ground. This natural cast of a footprint was formed when the impression left in the ground by the animal's foot was filled with sand, probably during an incoming tide. The Folkestone tracks may also be the youngest known dinosaur tracks from the British Isles.

This dramatic discovery removes any doubt that dinosaurs did indeed roam this part of the earth that we now know as Folkestone.

A Coastal Walk

Chris and Norah Newey, two senior citizens from Yateley in Hants, have recently completed a marathon walk of the Coast of Mainland Britain, finishing when they walked into Folkestone on Saturday 18th November 2017.



They were welcomed by The Worshipful Town Mayor of Folkestone, Councillor Roger West and a group of 32 family and friends. The

distance proved to be 4298 miles, completed in stages over ten years. Chris (a retired Army Officer) and Norah (a retired Nurse) are not new to long distance walking having previously walked from John O'Groats to Lands End, a total of 925 miles, again in stages between 2001 and 2004. It was at the finish of that walk that Chris realised he wanted a greater challenge, to walk the Coast of Mainland Britain, luckily Norah said she would do it too.

As a rule of thumb they decided to walk the Coast anti-clockwise, following the route of Shally Hunt and her husband Richard (who walked in the opposite direction). It was her book "the Sea on our Left" which inspired them to do the walk, as was the BBC series 'Coast' on television at the time.

It was decided, in order to enjoy the adventure, they would firstly not walk in the rain, and secondly, not walk more than 12 miles in any one day. They failed on both counts! As they were not sure if they would complete the walk (before their joints failed), they decided not to raise money for charity. People often asked them 'what was the most beautiful part of the walk or what did they enjoy most?' Well, that proved difficult to answer, they have fond memories of different areas. The remoteness of North West Scotland, the long flat beaches of Northumberland and Pembrokeshire, the

panoramic views of Devon/Cornwall. One thing was clear, the United Kingdom is a beautiful place and the best way to see it is on foot! Wherever they were, people were genuinely interested in what they were doing and wished them every success in achieving it.

When they started on their journey, they had a caravan, but latterly a small campervan which they used to live in. So, with military precision, campsites were selected, bus and train timetables obtained and each day's walk was planned using Ordnance Survey maps. In remote areas friends joined them to help out with logistics of getting from point A to point B and on a few walks joined them. During the walk they managed to wear out three pairs of boots in 425 days of walking – but thankfully they did not suffer illness or injury.

Now the walk is over – what next? Probably a well-earned rest, but they do plan on moving to Kent to be nearer to their family in old age. A remarkable achievement, well done.


